Medication Assisted Treatment

- Methadone or Buprenorphine/Naloxone (brand name "Suboxone")
- Effective in moderate to severe cases of addiction

NCPHD BOARD OF HEALTH REPORT - MAY 2025

As you will read, through the month of April NCPHD staff has continued in myriad ways, amid a time of funding limbo and uncertainty, to show up and work hard each day for our community.

As if on cue, Oregon Coalition of Local Health Officials (CLHO) released the 2025 Oregon Local Public Health Workforce report – to which NCPHD contributed. This report reflects the collective insights of Oregon's 33 LPHAs and highlights the urgent staffing and funding challenges facing our local public health system, and I strongly encourage Board members to read it. As you know, chronic underfunding and workforce shortages continue to make it difficult to meet the needs of Oregon's 4.2 million residents.

The findings reinforce the most pressing issues LPHAs face:

- Inadequate pay
- Burnout
- Limited capacity for recruitment, training, and retention

The report also underscores the need for sustained, full funding of public health modernization. When the Legislature committed to modernizing Oregon's public health system in 2016, the estimated cost was \$210 million per biennium. To date, only half of that has been funded, and the current estimated cost to fully modernize has more than doubled.

CLHO is urging state lawmakers to allocate **an additional \$65.2 million per biennium** this session to finally fulfill the promise of a fully modernized, equitable public health system for every community in Oregon.

We are fortunate in our county partnerships with Wasco and Sherman, as they continue to dedicate funds toward public health, and contribute strongly to our organization's stability.

FOUNDATIONAL PROGRAMS

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

Our Environmental Health team worked with 22 vendors at this year's Cherry Festival, helping them meet food safety standards. Large community events like this bring in high volumes of food service activity in a short period of time, making proactive support and timely inspections especially important. These efforts help prevent foodborne illness, support local vendors, and ensure a safe experience for the public.

We are excited to announce that a new Environmental Health Specialist Trainee has been hired and is expected to join our team on June 1. This addition will strengthen our capacity to provide essential services and support the environmental public health of our community.

The Oregon Department of Environmental Quality is currently accepting public comment on proposed updates to the Onsite Wastewater Management Program rules. These changes aim to address sewer availability and accessory dwelling unit (ADU) issues raised by 2023 legislation, while also modernizing and improving rule language. Over 30% of Oregonians dispose of wastewater from their homes and businesses through septic systems. The last substantial update to the onsite program rules occurred in 2014. Updated rules are important to LPHAs, as they provide greater clarity, consistency, and improved tools to support homeowners, businesses, and the protection of public health and the environment.

PREVENTION AND HEALTH PROMOTION

WIC - Maricela Elias-WIC Coordinator

The Oregon Health Authority staff presented on the Bonneville Dam fish advisories on April 9th. The staff present found the presentation very informative and expressed that they learned a great deal. As a result, staff feel better prepared to share accurate information and engage in meaningful conversations with participants.

WIC and the Mid-Columbia Children's Council are also exploring opportunities for collaboration on future projects. We are currently working on a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to support each other's programs by organizing and combining resources, reaching new audiences, and strengthening referrals.

Additionally, the Resources Available for Migrant Access to Services (RAMAS) meetings have begun. The purpose of these meetings is to bring partners together to coordinate services and support for migrant families in the Columbia Gorge. This initiative includes collaborations with the Migrant Education Program, One Community Health, The Next Door, the Columbia Gorge Food Bank, and WIC & the immunizations programs from the North Central Public Health District. Two more meetings are scheduled for May.

In April, 297 participants were scheduled for appointments. Out of those, 204 completed their appointments, and there were an additional 11 walk-ins, making a total of 215 completed appointments and a show rate of 72.39% for April 2025.

Home Visiting – Lori Treichel, Home Visiting Lead

The Home Visiting team completed 83 home visits in April, exceeding their goals and providing stellar care for all their clients.

Lori and Maria attended the statewide CaCoon meeting, to network with partners and get continuing education on the issues facing families and children with special health care needs.

Tobacco Prevention & Education Program (TPEP) Coordinator – Neita Cecil

Neita presented the facts about vaping to five classes of students at The Dalles Middle School on April 23. This included a 35-minute presentation and knowledge check (with questionnaires completed before and after the presentation). It was interesting that most students already knew that they are targeted by tobacco companies and that vapes contain nicotine. Today's students are more sophisticated about this than the students NCPHD presented to a number of years ago. Those students were largely unaware that vapes contain nicotine.

Neita also completed and submitted her workplan for the 2025-27 biennium, and is currently working on some updates that are due May 15.

ACCESS TO CLINICAL AND PREVENTATIVE SERVICES – Martha McInnes, Director

April was a busy and affirming month for NCPHD. We successfully completed both our Triennial Review for Reproductive Health and the Biannual VFC Review—and we're proud to report that both were glowing! Reviewers commended the high-quality reproductive healthcare we provide to our community and recognized our strong vaccine stewardship.

Clinical Expansion & Training

Julia attended a hands-on clinical training at a Reproductive Health Training Center, focusing on Long-Acting Reversible Contraception (LARC) and vasectomy procedures. This marks an important first step in exploring the possibility of expanding our services to include vasectomies—a much-needed resource given the current regional gap in access.

Continued Services at NORCOR

We're still regularly visiting NORCOR to provide STI screenings and birth control. Although we

did not reapply for the next round of BHRN funding, we are optimistic about securing alternative grant support to sustain—and even grow—this work. Having consistent clinical staff has significantly strengthened our impact in this area.

New Community Partnerships

We've launched exciting collaborations with Gorge Access and the Columbia Gorge Pride Alliance (via The Next Door, Inc.):

- With Gorge Access, we're supporting Spanish-language workshops on abortion access and emergency contraception, and co-developing emergency contraception kits. 60 kits will be distributed through their network and many more stocked in NCPHD's Wellness Vending Machine.
- With Columbia Gorge Pride Alliance, we're proud to participate in their "30 Days of Gay" celebration by hosting an open house at NCPHD. This event will gather community feedback on how we can create more inclusive, welcoming spaces for LGBTQ2SIA+ individuals. We plan to meet quarterly to build on this work based on community needs.

Clinic Environment & Equipment Updates

We're actively working to make our lobby more welcoming and inclusive to better reflect the diverse community we serve.

Thanks to RH Modernization funding, we're also adding an ultrasound machine to enhance patient care. This will allow us to accurately date pregnancies, support timely prenatal care, and troubleshoot IUD/IUS placements. Additionally, we'll be able to bill for ultrasounds, helping to sustain the equipment's maintenance long-term.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASE CONTROL – Marta Fisher, Regional Epidemiologist

The communicable disease team has a lot of preparatory work going on right now.

Given the way the Texas measles outbreak is evolving, we want to be prepared in case we get a few cases here. To that end, we are reviewing our existing plans, resources shared by OHA, and communications that other jurisdictions have recently shared to make sure that we are as prepared as possible.

Additionally, we ordered an XRF analyzer that will allow Zach Hale to measure lead levels in walls, toys, cosmetics, and anything else that might have exposed a child to lead. Now that the tools are on the way, we need to build out our plans to become a regional lead resource.

Finally, we have been developing good partnerships with the health staff that work in the local schools. As the end of the school year approaches, we are setting up plans for next year's meetings with them. We want to commit to next year's meetings before the schools close for the summer.

FOUNDATIONAL CAPABILITIES (supporting all the foundational programs)

Leadership and Organizational Competencies

- The FY26 Budget process is progressing, with a budget committee meeting scheduled for May 22.
- We will receive the final FY22 audit report from Pauly, Rogers, & Co. and work on a written response and plan for any audit findings, and we will being our FY23 audit.

Health Equity and Cultural Responsiveness

Of our 25 staff members, 8 are bilingual/bicultural in Spanish, and an additional 4 are bilingual in Spanish (including our Health Officer). This reflects the population of our area, demonstrating a strong commitment to meaningful language access for all our services. We additionally utilize a certified Language Line for other languages we encounter including Russian, Vietnamese, and Chinese.

Community Partnership Development

NCPHD engages in many local, regional, and state-level partnerships, examples including:

- Director is a voting member on the Columbia Gorge CCO Clinical Advisory Panel (CAP)
- Regular meetings with MCCFL, The Next Door, Hood River Health Department, NORCOR, and others.

Assessment and Epidemiology

NCPHD and Hood River Health Department Collaborate in a quarterly communicable disease/epidemiology meeting. We partner in communications, reporting, and preparedness for a coordinated regional effort.

Marta and Zach, on our CD team are currently training on several data and coding systems to provide the capability of creating our own data dashboards to share meaningful information to the community about our area, providing actionable data to help keep themselves and their families healthy. Marta is looking at data not just for communicable disease, but also expanding into climate impact and health, reproductive health, and immunization.

Columbia Gorge Regional Community Health Assessment (CHA) was completed in the past several months, and Martha is participating in a workgroup for the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP).

Policy and Planning

 Martha continues to engage regionally and statewide as a member of the Conference & Coalition of Local Health Officials. During legislative sessions she works to respond to requests by the CLHO Executive Director in submitting letters of support and testimony for various bills.
